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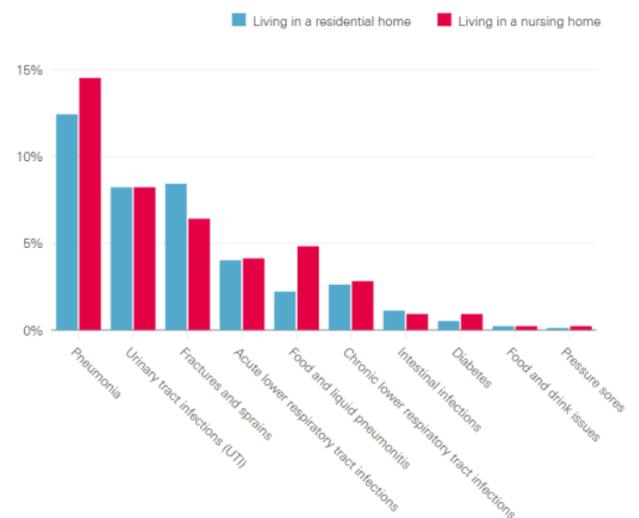
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### Helping frail or elderly patients avoid emergency care

Reducing emergency admissions from care homes has the potential to reduce pressure on hospitals. In [Emergency admissions to hospital from care homes: how often and what for?](#) The Health Foundation found for people aged 65 years or older, the overall number of emergency admissions from care homes in 2016/17 comprised 7.9% of the total number of emergency admission and the overall number of A&E attendances from care homes comprised 6.5% of attendances. An analysis of the impact of enhanced support initiatives associated with the NHS's New Care Models programme in care homes found there is greater potential to reduce emergency admissions and A&E attendance in residential care homes compared with nursing homes. Also, co-production between health care professionals and care homes is key to developing effective interventions. Access to additional clinical input by named GPs and primary care services and/or multidisciplinary teams may be a key element in reducing emergency hospital use.

In [Reducing length of stay: Case studies \(NHS England\)](#) one project at South Warwickshire NHS Foundation Trust focused on frailty. They put in place a process where patients suitable for same day emergency care and short (1-5 days) stays were identified immediately following ambulance drop off. Instead of being assessed in the Emergency Department (ED), they were transferred to the specialist Frailty Assessment Unit (FAU). This freed up ED cubicles and released the nurses to concentrate on other emergencies.
